Three Ways of Thinking About Books

Thinking Within the Text: (Literal information)

These questions can include:

Who are the characters and where does the story take place?

What was the problem and solution?

Can you give me a summary of the story?

What was a new word for you?

Thinking Beyond the Text: (Inferring, Synthesizing, Making Connections,

Predicting)

These questions can include:

What do you think will happen?

How does the character feel? How does the character change?

Do you know other stories like this?

What part of the story is important?

How do the pictures make you feel?

Why did the character act that way?

Did you ever feel like that?

Thinking About the Text (Analyzing and Critiquing Author's Craft)

These questions can include:

What words did the author use to describe the character? Setting?

How do the pictures connect with the words?

Where was an exciting part of the story?

Is this a nonfiction or fiction story?

Did you like the story? Why?

Why did the author write this book?

How did the author organize this book? (by chapter or in order of events)

How did the author make this story funny or interesting or surprising?

How did the author set up the problem in the story?
